# **Board of Director's Report**

The Board met on April 16<sup>th</sup> and a considered a full agenda. Crawford MacIntyre reported for the Nominations Committee and noted that due to term limits and early retirements, there will be a number of vacancies to fill for the next Board of Directors. The Committee plans to meet before the May Board meeting. All Directors were asked for the names of possible candidates for Board positions. Crawford also reported on behalf of Constitution and By-laws and requested that Notice of Motion be given to the membership regarding the Board decision to amend the By-laws to change the status of the **Friends of the Lake Committee** from ad hoc to a standing committee of the Board and that the proposed Terms of Reference be published in the next newsletter.

Secretary-Treasurer Cheryl Savery presented an April financial report and a proposed 2011 budget, which were discussed and approved by the Board. The **2011 Budget** is printed in this edition of the News and will be presented for approval at the AGM in July. Ralph Wirsig reported that 88 memberships had been renewed for 2011 and that revenue from advertisements in the News for 2011 was \$1050 to date.

Saundra Rider reported on planning for a number of events over the summer months. A detailed report is part of this edition of the News. The Board established the date of the Annual General Meeting to be **Saturday July 9<sup>th</sup> at Perth Road Public School.** More details will follow in future newsletters. Wayne Myles reported that the Friends of the Lake were progressing toward a detailed plan of activities for 2011 and would have a full report in May.

The Board will next meet on May14th.

The primary purpose of Friends of the Lake Committee is to educate the residents of Buck Lake about its environs and promote the means by which the health and enjoyment of the lake can be maintained for present and future generations.

The Buck Lake Association (BLA) Friends of the Lake Standing Committee terms of reference are:

- 1. To take the lead in planning for the future of Buck Lake by developing and updating the BLA Lake Plan.
- 2. To perform a prominent administrative and leadership role in the implementation of the BLA Lake Plan goals and objectives.
- 3. To coordinate the collection and documentation of lake information to inform Buck Lakers about the lake and its environs through research, surveys, individual data collection and partnering with various government and non-governmental organizations.
- 4. To offer lake residents opportunities for taking action to sustain and improve the water quality and shoreline of the lake.
- 5. To educate the Buck Lake community regarding the BLA Lake Plan and its goals and objectives through displays, information sessions and workshops.
- 6. To advise on the advocacy role that the BLA should play with the Township and other governments whose mandates include management responsibilities over activities bearing on the health of the lake and of our community given the information gathered in the Lake Plan process.
- 7. To mobilize and recruit members of the BL community to assist in achieving the goals and objectives of the BLA Lake Plan.
- 8. To coordinate the volunteer lists and activities to ensure an effective and timely use of their work.

#### Beaver Troubles (Credits to EMC and Grayden McClurg):

<u>EMC Lifestyle</u> - Once classified as a fish due to its scaly tail, the beaver is in fact Canada's most iconic rodent, being the national symbol and having a place on our nickel. However, with their increasing abundance, rural interactions with beavers are becoming more common and beavers do not necessarily leave a good first impression! "Busy" beavers have been known to cause severe property damage by cutting down trees, blocking culverts and drain pipes, and causing serious floods. Although there are short-term issues associated with local beavers, their long-term contributions to the environment make them a worth-while neighbour when managed effectively.



The beaver is an ingenious ecosystem engineer that shapes the unique rural environment that Canadians take pride in, and its ability to beneficially modify its ecosystem renders this species one of the largest contributors to Canada's aquatic environments. In addition, beavers ensure productive ecosystem functioning, which creates and upholds the natural beauty and species diversity of Southern Ontario. This species ensures the integrity of aquatic habitats through the enhanced growth of aquatic vegetation, which prevents erosion and acts as a buffer in the face of contamination. restoring pristine conditions. Beaver damming also shapes the species diversity in the surrounding area by providing ideal habitats for a variety of charismatic bird, mammal and fish species. Not only are these animals captivating, but they also provide recreation for birdwatchers, fishers and hunters alike. One of the main concerns is their sensitivity to human interference and

as such, habitat degradation has become a major player in beaver mortality. With increases in human population size comes the inevitable strain on freshwater resources and the disappearance of wetlands, especially in the Kingston region. This will have both short and long-term effects that will ripple through the Canadian wilderness and encompass numerous other species. By now you have hopefully become convinced that the beaver is not just another of Canada's irksome rodents. But, you may still have some skepticism about how to coexist with these devious dam builders. You may be wondering, "what are my options for ending my beaver woes? Should I turn to trapping, or maybe even shooting?" The answer to the latter question is no, there are many solutions to beaver management that do not involve lethal actions.

To deal with beavers that are destroying personal property, an effective strategy is to protect trees using rigid welded wire fencing with 4-inch mesh and a height of at least 36 inches. No repellents are legal in Canada, but homemade substitutes can be used including textual repellents like outdoor latex paint mixed with coarse sand. In situations in which beaver relocation is the preferred strategy, the beaver baffler may be the tool of choice. This is a long-term solution that will leave beavers unable to control water levels at their dam, discouraging them and eventually causing abandonment. If property flooding is your main concern, the Clemsen Beaver Pond Leveler would be an effective solution. This allows you to manipulate the water level of a beaver pond without disturbing the beaver habitat. On April 10<sup>th</sup> I watched with great pride and emotion as Ron Mattey and Duncan Sinclair presented a cheque at the Easter Seals Telethon on behalf of Buck Lake. The cheque was in the amount of **\$13,680**. That's correct – thirteen thousand, six hundred and eighty dollars to send children with physical disabilities to Camp Merrywood. Bravo Buck Lakers!

I would like to give Buck Lake newcomers a brief history of the event. Six years ago it was decided that Buck Lake was a fantastic place to live and/or cottage, trailer, camp or just visit. We could swim, boat, fish, hike, watch the sun rise and set – all those great things but we thought of underprivileged children who couldn't readily do those things because of physical handicaps. We decided to raise \$2000 to Send a Kid to Camp, to enjoy for 10 days what we take for granted on Buck Lake all year long. It became our mantra. Flying by the seat of our pants, a Boatilla was organized. Boats met at the culvert, some decorated, and we paraded for a while and stopped at Christmas Bay. With waves and wind disrupting

everything, Ron presented a cheque in the unbelievable amount of \$3500 to Easter Seals while aboard Rick Smith's pontoon boat – a dangerous maneuver even in calm waters! (Sorry Rick.)

The following year, Randy Ruttan invited us to use the Hidden Valley Trailer Park to celebrate the cheque presentation.

Since then, the event has grown and over \$50,000 has been raised by the Buck Lake community to send children to Camp Merrywood. Yes, that's correct – **FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS.** Now that is something to be proud of!

This year, the **Buck Lake Boatilla** is **Saturday**, **July 2**, **2011**. Again we will meet at the culvert and parade the lake, ending at Hidden Valley Campground for a Barbecue.

• Spring cleaning may be late this year due to the fact that spring is late but remember a great way to add and subtract from your collection of "stuff" is to come to the **Giant Yard Sale at Perth Road United Church Hall on Saturday May 21<sup>st</sup> beginning at 9:00 a.m.** Donations are gladly accepted on Friday evening or first thing on Saturday. • The shoal markers should be in place over the next few weeks. The red inflatable markers used last year on a trial basis, will be slowly replaced with a more sturdy hazard marker buoy (yellow) recommended by FOCA. The water is so high at present that most known shoals are well

covered but deadheads and other floating debris are a danger. Be on the watch when boating in early season...wear a life jacket at all times. The water is still very cold and there aren't many boats in the water to lend assistance if needed. The high water means that the Culvert clearance is much less than in the summer or fall and floating and sunken debris can get caught in the Culvert...be observant and safe on the lake.

• The South Frontenac Natural Environment Committee is presenting a talk on bats by Matt Saunders at the Trinity United Church Fellowship Hall (5569 Hwy 38, Verona) on Saturday, May 28 at1:00pm. In addition, there will be a demonstration of bat house building, as well a very limited number of bat house kits for sale at \$10/ea. (Matt makes the kits himself.)

Also, Matt always tries to bring at least one bat with him to every event he addresses. Matt has been a guest speaker a few times at the Cat. Cons. Area and has been very popular, especially with the kids.
