Buck Lake News - June 2020

Boat Right – Be Polite

Tubing, wake boarding and water skiing are popular summer activities on Buck Lake, and while they can provide immense enjoyment for those participating, they can also be a source of great annoyance for some of your friends and neighbours around the lake. This is especially true on a small lake like Buck Lake, where in many areas it is difficult to get very far from an inhabited shore.



Boat Right – Be Polite is the slogan of a boater education program developed by the Lake of Bays Association after conducting a recreational boating survey, which found that five activities - water skiing, tubing, wakeboarding and operating personal watercraft or noisy boats cause particular problems for other people enjoying the lake. This article is taken from their <u>pamphlet</u> and outlines some guidelines to help reduce the potentially negative impact of those activities your friends and neighbours.

Boat Right:

- Towboats must have an operator, a spotter and a seat for each person being towed.
- Do not tow before sunrise or one hour after sunset.
- Remember, the speed limit is 10 kilometres per hour within 30 metres of shore.
- Those towed must wear an approved personal flotation device.
- Know and obey the right-of-way rules.
- You can take off from shore at speed provided you drive **straight** out from shore.

Be Polite:

- Keep well beyond the 30 metre limit to avoid swimmers and boaters near shore.
- Don't swing your riders in front of other people's docks. Drop them outside the 30 metre limit or come in and out perpendicular to your dock.
- Avoid multiple runs in the same area. Vary your route to share the pain.
- Keep a safe distance from other towboats, which stop and turn unpredictably.
- Don't tow around canoes, kayaks, sailboats or small outboards. They may cross your rider's path, and your wake can capsize them.
- Concentrate! Most boating incidents are caused by operators not paying attention.

More Considerations for Wake Boarding

- Boats designed for wake boarding can create much bigger wake than other boats on the lake. Guidelines indicate that you should try to keep at least 300 metres off shore. Your wake can damage docks, moored boats, the shoreline, and wildlife habitat. The 30 metre limit is not enough for your wake to dissipate. Realistically, however, there is almost nowhere on Buck Lake that is 300 metres from all shorelines meaning this limit is not really feasible on our lake. Even so, please try to use areas where you can keep as far from shore as possible.
- Repeated runs in front of the same cottages are profoundly annoying because of swells and noise. Vary your route frequently.

Internet and Cell Service – Current Status and Possible Upcoming Improvements

As anyone who has been to Buck Lake knows, our access to the Internet and to cell service is not like in the city.

Internet

For those in the 273 (Westport) telephone exchange, DSL internet is available from <u>WTC</u> <u>Communications</u> which by most accounts works quite well.


For the remainder of the lake in the 353 (Inverary) telephone exchange, the main option is Xplornet. Xplornet provides internet via broadband towers and satellite. The main internet tower near Buck Lake is located on Leland Road north of Perth Road village. Unfortunately, to use this tower, you must have line-of-site access making it only available to a fraction of the properties around the lake. Xplornet's satellite internet service comes from 2 satellites: EchoStar XIX (97.1 West longitude) and ViaSat-2 (69.9 West longitude). Again, you must have line-of-site to the satellite in order to use it. Due to their height above the earth, approximately 10,000 km, satellite internet will have delays that will affect conversations. Although the service is acceptable for most uses, it certainly does not compare with city internet and the speed can slow to a crawl at times.

One final option is using cellular data with a Bell or Rogers hub.

Cell Service

Cellular service at Buck Lake is patchy at best. The two providers with cell towers in the area are Bell (blue on map) and Rogers (red). As shown on the map these cell towers are all around the area, but there are none within even 10 km of Buck Lake.

Many residents report that they have no cell service at all. However, for others, adding a cell signal booster antennae, has allowed them to get rid of the landline.



Possible Upcoming Improvements

There are several exciting changes possibly coming in the next year or so that hopefully will result in improvements to our internet and cell service at the lake. These include:

- EORN Mobile Broadband Project
- Starlink Satellite Internet
- Xplornet/Stonepeak Sale

Each of these is described below.

EORN Mobile Broadband Project

<u>EORN</u> (Eastern Ontario Regional Network) is currently spearheading a \$213-million public-private partnership to improve cell service across the Eastern Ontario region.

From 2010 to 2015, EORN built the \$175-million network that improved broadband access to about 90% of Eastern Ontario. This innovative public-private partnership was funded by the federal, provincial and municipal governments, and private sector service providers. This is the funding that brought Xplornet internet to Buck Lake. Prior to that most users in the 353 phone exchange could only access the internet via dial-up – Remember those days?

So now, EORN is planning to do the same thing for cellular service. They have currently received funding commitments from all three levels of government.

The federal and provincial governments have committed \$71 million each to the \$213 million project. All members of the Eastern Ontario Wardens' Caucus and most municipalities within the Eastern Ontario Mayors' Caucus are contributing to the \$10 million municipal share. Mobile carriers are expected to provide the balance of the funding.

The goal is to provide 99% of the areas where there are homes, businesses and major roads with cell calling service. It will also further expand cell data coverage and capacity to support the use of typical smartphone apps and streaming video.

On April 20, 2020, EORN issued the Request for Proposal (RFP) to tackle cellular dead zones across eastern Ontario. This is an exciting first step toward seeing better cell service at the lake. The closing date for bids is August 14, 2020. However, the RFP stipulates that all work must be completed by July 2025. Hopefully, we see progress long before then – fingers crossed.



Starlink Satellite Internet

<u>Starlink</u> is a satellite constellation being constructed by SpaceX. The constellation will consist of thousands of small satellites in low Earth orbit. Currently, they have launched 540 satellites, with plans to continue launching 60 additional satellites every 2 weeks during 2020.

According to their website, Starlink will deliver high speed broadband internet to locations where access has been unreliable, expensive, or completely unavailable. The performance will far surpasses that of traditional satellite internet, and will not be constrained by ground infrastructure limitations. Unlike the stationary satellites used by Xplornet, the Starlink satellites are only 550 km above the earth meaning they will not be subject to the same delay times. Also, because the satellites are moving overhead, line-of-sight should not be as much of an issue.

SpaceX has stated that Starlink "will begin offering commercial service in the northern United States and southern Canada" before the end of 2020, "and then will rapidly expand to near global coverage of the populated world in 2021." More recently, SpaceX founder Elon Musk has tweeted that "private beta testing begins in ~3 months (August 2020), public beta testing in ~6 months (November 2020), starting with high latitudes"

This is certainly exciting news. However, it remains to be seen how well this will work in practice.

Xplornet/Stonepeak

On June 11, 2020, Xplornet announced the completion of its sale to Stonepeak Infrastructure Partners. At this point in time, it is difficult to know if this will be a good thing or a bad thing for internet access at the lake.

Stonepeak is a North American focused infrastructure firm that manages \$24.4 billion USD of assets for its investors (as of May 22, 2020). The firm has a strong track record of investing in mission-critical telecommunication businesses globally. Stonepeak indicate that it is committed to support the existing Xplornet business plan.

The current executive team will continue leading Xplornet and the company will remain headquartered in New Brunswick.

Allison Lenehan, President and CEO of Xplornet has stated, "This deal will enable Xplornet to expand coverage, increase investment, and accelerate improvements to our broadband network. For our customers, this means unprecedented speeds, unlimited data plans, and 5G services at affordable prices. Rural Canadians deserve access to the same quality of broadband as in urban Canada. It is time to go faster". Hopefully this is a good sign for better things to come.

Patience and Persistence Prevails

For most of the twenty years I have lived on the north end of Buck Lake's North Branch the resident pair of loons have nested on the little island opposite my property. Some three or four years ago, when beavers dammed up the outlet on the South Branch and high water flooded the island, they did nest on a loon platform I built and anchored in Richardson's Bay. Although they did inspect it again this spring, the loons rejected its artificiality and returned to the island where they nested and sat uneventfully for about three weeks (the incubation period is 26 to 29 days) before the eagle came.

My son and I were dock at the dock at the time when we were startled by loud cries of alarm from the island where we saw the two loons rising up in the water, beating their wings, close to the north end of the island where a mature bald eagle had landed; two seagulls, also screaming loudly, took turns 'dive-bombing' it. Getting a pair of binoculars, we could see that the eagle was impassively eating something that we feared was the content of one or another of the nest of the loons or gulls. The commotion continued for a good 15 minutes or so after which the loons and gulls disappeared and about 10 minutes later the eagle flew off.

Feeling sad that there would not be a loon chick in the bay this year, my mood was lifted the next day when I saw one of the loons back on its nest, an observation confirmed by my neighbour whose view of the nest site was less obscured by clumps of grass on the island than mine. Obviously, the loon chick had not become the eagle's lunch.

But worry returned a day or so later when, down on the dock again, I spotted the white head and tail on what I had thought was a turkey vulture circling around. Sure enough, it was not long before the eagle swooped in and landed on the island again, not far from the nest from which the loon rapidly decamped into the water. Shortly thereafter, seemingly out of nowhere a group of 5 loons appeared, congregating in the deep water in a sort of circle around the end of the island on which the eagle was standing, eating something and paying no attention to the silent ring of loons around him. Some 15 minutes later, the loons all dove and presumably swam away, and the eagle flew off. Peace and uncertainty about the loon egg/chick reigned again to be relieved the next morning when Mama or Papa loon was once again seen sitting on the nest.


The same scene was revisited a day or two later without loon reinforcements. The eagle swooped in, the sitting loon left the nest, dove, disappeared, and after standing around for a while the eagle flew away.

This morning, Friday, 19 June, out on the deck cleaning windows, the unmistakeably happy call of the proud parents announced the safe arrival of one baby loon at approximately 9:45. Grabbing the binoculars, I saw the chick swimming in the little gap between the two adults, starting right at the edge of the island and gradually moving out until I lost sight of them in the trees that obscured my view. Later my neighbour called to confirm that she too had seen the three of them. The eagle may have landed, three times no less, but the resident loons and we on the north bay of the North Branch of Buck Lake have a chick! Patience and persistence prevailed.

Water Clarity – Secchi Disk Measurements


In May's newsletter, we reported on the total phosphorus measurements in the lake. This month, we take a look at the water clarity as measured at various locations in the lake.

While total phosphorus concentrations are the best way to describe the nutrient status of the lake, regular Secchi depths can help to identify changes in water clarity that are not linked to nutrient status (zebra mussels, climate change, etc.).




Secchi measurements are preformed by lowering a Secchi disk into the water until it is no longer visible, and then recording the depth of the disk.

On the North Branch of Buck Lake, secchi disc measurements have been performed since 1975. As shown in the graphs below, the Secchi disk measurements increased slightly and then have gradually decreasing since 1996. This means that the water in the lake was becoming less clear.



On the South Branch, we began taking secchi disc readings in 1985 at a location near Porcupine Island. However, this ended in 2005 when the person taking the measurements, move away from the lake. More recently, measurements have been take at two locations near the south end of the lake and at one location at the north end, just north of Buck and Porcupine Islands. The graphs appear to show that the south branch may also be becoming less clear, and that that the lake is slightly clearer at the north end of the branch.



One factor that can affect water clarity is the presence of zebra mussels which, can actually cause in the clarity to increase. As zebra mussels feed, they filter plant plankton from the water, making the water clearer, but not cleaner. As the sun is able to penetrate deeper into the lake, aquatic plants can take root in more extensive areas than they did before zebra mussels appeared. This is unlikely to be an issue on the North Branch where the calcium levels in the lake are too low to sustain zebra mussels. However, zebra mussels have been found throughout the southern end of the South Branch and may be at some point have an impact on the water clarity. This does not appear to have happened yet.

In a recent communication from FOCA, we learned that the Environmental Test Centre is closed for the summer and there will be no more water samples analyzed for phosphorus and calcium in the near future. Secchi disc measurements however continue.
